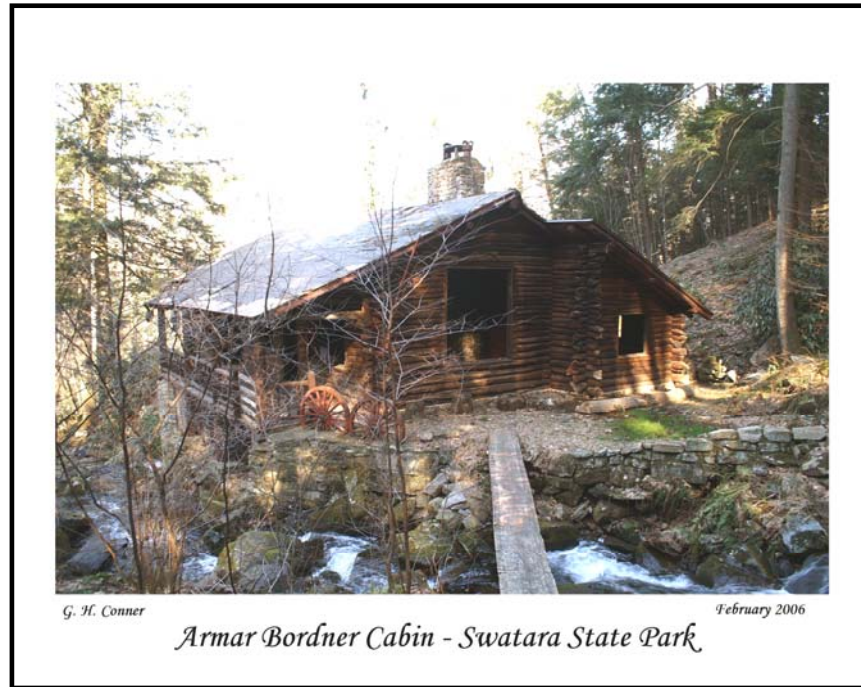


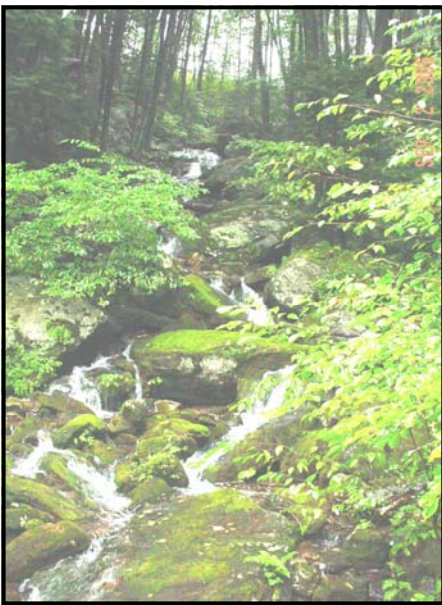
# Historic Armar Bordner Cabin Saved!

Thanks to the fortitude of Commissioner Jo Ellen Litz, Swatara Creek Watershed Association (SCWA) and countless volunteers and Donations, Armar Bordner Cabin has been saved from destruction!



"Huddled against the hillside next to a waterfall and against a forest of hemlocks, sequestered in the mountains of Bethel Township, stands a rustic hand-hewn log cabin...", (*Lebanon Daily News*, April 19, 1990, Pat Seaman). This cabin and its location, which can only be truly appreciated by a visit in person, is located deep in the woods of Swatara State Park. In 2005-06, with looming threats that the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) no longer wished to maintain the cabin and planned to tear it down, the SCWA successfully petitioned Governor Rendell, Senator Brightbill, and DCNR to lease the cabin.

Soon after the lease was signed and in hand, repairs to the deteriorating structure began. A new roof was placed, graffiti removed and floor boards replaced. Various other projects are in the works and SCWA is looking for volunteers to "Adopt the Cabin" and help monitor the cabin one month at a time.
